Come with me, we're going to take a little tour of Madrid. Here we're always very friendly and welcoming to newcomers.




I'll start with Plaza Mayor.



Animal-drawn carts brought food in through those huge arches. These days, there's a stamp and coin market held here every Sunday. The square also hosts concerts, and, of course, at Christmas there's a giant tree and a Christmas market. It's not that far off from how it was done in the old days.





















Things that are really typical of Madrid

We've got a sweet tooth in Madrid. We really love bartolillos, custard-filled turnovers that have been around for ages, and torrijas, Spain's answer to French toast. We also love napolitanas, which are sweet pastries with different fillings, hot chocolate and churros, which are like long, thin doughnuts, chocolate "sardines" sold during Carnival, coronas de la Almudena, which are ring-shaped cakes filled with whipped cream, and sweets. We've even got some that are shaped like violets, and they're delicious.

We've also got wafers...yum yum! We mostly eat them during the city's different festivities. Before, I mentioned chulapos and chulapas. They're people who wear traditional Madrid dress during our celebrations, which are also called *verbenas*. They sound a bit cocky when they talk, but they're really nice and they like dancing the chotis, one of our traditional dances. There are food stalls, music, dancing and fairs at the verbenas. They're held in the spring and summer in places like Las Vistillas Gardens. During the celebrations, you'll see wafer-sellers with our famous wafers, Manila shawls hanging from people's balconies, bunting in the streets and loads of carnations everywhere. You can't miss them if you visit Madrid in mid-May, during the San Isidro celebrations, or in August, during the San Cayetano, San Lorenzo and La Paloma festivities.
